sun is back members are coming out of the woodwork. The usual Friday night crowd has been at the club, but I'm seeing other members that don't frequent the club as much showing up also. Spring is in the air! I say this because as spring approaches and with Friday Night Races not so far off in the distance, we know that more and more members will be using the club restaurant and bar. Our club management is working very hard to create new and creative menus for lunches and dinners. The bar and restaurant staff are anxious to serve you. The new (POS) Point of Sale computer system, which I'm sure you've noticed at the bar, is becoming more familiar to club employees and new software menus on the touch screen will allow even faster service. The bottom line, we are working to make the restaurant and bar a more enjoyable place for members and guests. Making a reservation will result in a more enjoyable evening, improved quality of food and timely service. With that said, we don't live in a perfect world and there could be a few tables available depending on the night and the number of guests. We want you to dine in our beautiful Club as often as you can and appreciate your consideration regarding this challenge.

"Ladies Seminar Was a Smashing Success". That was the headline in the 1985 Telltale article. It was twenty years ago that three women from our club, Jytte Birnbaum, Roz Colver and assisted by Renee Soleway launched

the first sailing seminar in response to CYC women's request to learn more about sailing. The first year, 18 women took the 6 day course and 11 graduated. Evidently, graduation requirements were stringent! The course material covered much of what we teach today- terminology, sail trim, safety and boat handling. The course was taught every two years with attendance increasing and instructors and boats added as needed. The instruction boats used were similar in size and easily managed by new sailors. They used member boats, as we do today, starting with Knarrs, a Santa Cruz 27, an Islander 28 and a Soverel 33 for the first year.

By the third session in 1990, Chris Canada and her sister, Donna Block joined the founders to help teach the larger class. In 1993, an intermediate course was added that covered advanced

sail trim, spinnaker and racing tactics and Marcia Peck and Kay Rudiger were asked to help instruct.

The WSS (Women's Sailing Seminar) has continued each year with the attendance increasing to about 60. Many women took the class more than once because of their positive experiences. The WSS also encouraged women who were interested in racing to come to the Friday night races and volunteer to crew.

This year the WSS is May 21, 22 and June 4th. A celebration of our 20th year is being planned. Please come and honor the founders on the 22nd. Celebration information will be posted at the Club and the website.

The festival is in its fourth year and shows no signs of slowing down. At this writing, we're just a few days into the experiment of hosting the festival at the club, but it seems to be going well. We are learning a few things, such as whether you can sell drinks to moviegoers at 10:30 am (no) and whether the festival increased dining room attendance (it seems so).

We're hoping to make this an annual event. One issue, of course, is CYC's out-of-pocket costs. We've solicited contributions from our membership. We've already had a few generous contributions. Horsfall and Vincent: Who Were Those Guys?

Corinthian's spring regatta is named for Warren "Vince" Vincent and George Horsfall, two members who were much loved by their fellow members and contributed a lot to the

Club. Vince's father, Ben, was a prominent member of Corinthian and a major factor in Bay racing in the early 1900s, with the MOONLIGHT and the RAINBOW. Many of Ben Vincent's trophies are on display at the Club.

Vince originally joined San Francisco Yacht Club in the 1950s, for reasons he never explained, but came over to Corinthian in the early 1960s. He introduced me to CYC in 1964 and we sailed together on the SPINDRIFT, a Hong Kong "O" design (36 ft. of solid teak, displacing 25,000 lbs in which we took three back to back Farallon races in our division (and won a couple of Buckners). He and I jointly owned a 22 ft. (plus 8 feet of bowsprit) gaff sloop built around 1900, aptly named the PANIC; he crewed for me on my first Knarr; and his last boat was the Lady Helmsman sloop DAMERIGHT he bought from the Birnbaums. We also did a lot of offshore racing and cruising together on various boats and a bunch of deliveries between SF and LA.

Vince was also a link to the past through his father's friendship – which Vince continued – with many legendry yachting figures of the pre-War era, including Tom Short, Charlie Langlais, Ray Kilborn (his uncle) and Lester Stone - all former members of CYC. Vince was Commodore in 1983 and 1984 – the last time a Commodore served two years back to back, a practice the Club followed for many years to provide continuity and stability. He died in 1988 and one of the biggest turnouts in CYC history, set sail to scatter his ashes under the Gate.

George Horsfall is best remembered as our perennial Race Committee Chairman in the 1980s, at a time when if you had been "conned" into accepting the job, it was yours until you found a replacement (has anything changed?). George was Rear Commodore for a couple of years, but had no aspirations to advance up the ladder, as his primary love was racing and remaining connected with it. He was also a great supporter of the Ladies Sailing Seminar started by Rosalind Colver and Jytte Birnbaum; and he also raced his Ranger 23 BALZAPHIRE with an all-ladies CYC crew. Sadly, George also went to greet his maker in 1988.

So these are the two Corinthians in whose memory and honor, the CYC spring regatta is named. Even if you didn't know them, pause for a moment and raise your glass. It was because of people like Vince and George, Corinthian remains as strong today as it did 120 years ago.

Howard Folker

Born in Mill Valley, April 7, 1922, Howard Folker is a true Marinite. As a matter of fact, his family lived there for sixty years before that!

His father passed away in 1929, the same year as the crash, and Howard's mother took in boarders to make ends meet. Howard attended Tam High and started working as a contractor and floor refinisher when he graduated from high school. His floor jobs made him some fast money and he bought a Mercury sail boat and joined the San Francisco Yacht Club. His group of friends included a young Hank Easom and Rolph Croker. Laughs Howard, "I think I only sailed the boat once cause I was working so much, and I already realized I'd joined the wrong yacht club."

In 1941, Howard went to war, and became a member of the Navy underwater demolition team, the first Navy seals. He was stationed on the destroyer escorts, the Crosley and the Bull, in the Philippines and Okinawa. Says Howard, "we carried so much of the explosive, Tetratol, they kept us as far away from the rest of the fleet as possible!" "All we had to wear were trunks, a mask, fins that weighed a ton, because they were made from reclaimed rubber, and a knife! Then you had to carry a canvas bag with 28 pounds of tetratol, slung around your neck. We had seven minutes to tie them to the target on the beach and ten minutes to swim back to a moving rubber boat. Some men would detonate, and swim 1500 yards offshore to be picked up. We were getting ready for

D-Day."


Luckily, Howard made it home, and left the Navy in 1945. He went back to his contracting business in Mill Valley, and built the home he still has today. In 1947, he met his future bride, Erdmuth, at a dance in the Corinthian ballroom! Unfortunately, she was Hank Easom's date! Says Howard, with a twinkle, "it took two years, but I married her."They raised two daughters, and joined the Corinthian in 1981. Says Howard, "all my friends were here, and we spent most of our time at the club. I got involved in doing the club's foundation work, driving piles, and putting a concrete retaining wall around the parking lot. Our group of guys was called the 'Pelicans'. We'd work all day and the club would give us lunch and one beer. I was the port captain in '85, and I put the sprinkler system in the club. We also made the bars you see today."

"I'm retired now and will soon have my eighty third birthday. My life has been fantastic! I'd do it all again. I feel the same way about the Navy. I'd do it all over again."
